Hello Marcus Whitman families!

This year we have begun to work with our students on learning and strengthening a variety of social skills that everyone needs to be successful in interacting in social and academic situations. Studies indicate that our current students need practice and understanding of the following basic skills:

*Following Instructions *Introducing Yourself *Asking For Help *Staying On Task *Accepting 'No' For An Answer *Disagreeing Appropriately *Showing Appreciation *Accepting Consequences or Criticism *Controlling Emotions



At Marcus Whitman, we will be focusing on **FOLLOWING INSTRUCTIONS** as our 1st school-wide social skill. The Steps we are teaching to all students are:

*Look at the person

*Say 'okay'

*Do what was asked right away

*Check back with the person

Below are some helpful hints on how to give kids instructions that will make both you and your child more successful – no matter the circumstances.

1. Get their attention. Go to your child or call them to you. Get down on their level and talk in a normal or calm voice while making eye contact. You can get your child's attention by calling his or her name. This helps your child focus and listen to your instructions. Whether it's your teen or your toddler, it is important for parents to get their child's attention as the first step in communication. This is especially true when you're frustrated after telling your child several times to do something and they ignore you.

2. Be brief and concise. Instructions should be short and to the point. The fewer words, the better. Keep it simple and short. Don't give long lists. If there are too many words, it becomes more difficult for the child to know or remember what is expected. The instruction should also be free of vague words that often lead to your child's interpretation. Most parents have given their children a chore to do or task to complete and found the outcome to be entirely different from their instruction. Why does this happen? It might be your instructions.

3. Say what to do. Let your child know what you want them to do rather than not to do. When we only describe the negative behavior – "don't roll your eyes" – we still leave many other options available (talking back, looking away, etc.). Tell your child what you want them to do: "Look at me and listen." This clear instruction does not allow for any other options. Sometimes we forget to tell children what to do, and we focus on telling children what not to do. This is a waste of time and sets children up to fail. Also, mean what you say. Do not ask your child to do something unless you mean it. Do not say, "Will you go brush your teeth?" If you put your instruction in the form of a question, this implies they have a choice. Instead, tell your child in a firm but pleasant voice what you want them to do. You should say, "Go brush your teeth right now. Check back in five minutes."

4. Be realistic. Give your child instructions you know he or she can follow. To set realistic expectations, make sure your instructions follow four key rules: *1. Is the instruction age appropriate? 2. Teach your child exactly what to do. 3. Have your child consistently demonstrate what to do. 4. Model the instruction for your child.* Children sometimes don't follow instructions because they feel overwhelmed and frustrated because the challenge or expectation of the instruction is beyond their ability.

5. Reward compliance. Let your child know that he or she did a good job following the instruction. Praise your child. The more you praise your child, the better the chances that he or she will follow directions in the future. Parents who reward their children for following instructions with praise or privileges that cost no money are more likely to have children who are willing to following instructions.





South Kitsap High School Registration

Next year our 8th grade students will move on to become Freshman at South Kitsap High School. To help get our students ready for this big leap counselors from SKHS visited MWMS on February 20th to provide information about registering for next year's classes. Please take some time to discuss with your student their course choices for next year and help them compete the appropriate forms. Registration materials are due back to MWMS on Wednesday, March 4th. Failing to register for classes will mean a year of coursework that students had little to no say in choosing. Please, help your student get off to a good start on their high school journey by helping them with this first step. Thank you.

FREE COLLEGE!

As we roll into second semester the counseling department is making another attempt to enroll all eligible 7th and 8th grade students into the **College Bound Scholarship Program**. Enrollment runs through the end of the year, but why wait?

What is the College Bound Scholarship? This scholarship program was developed to provide eligible students with an opportunity to get a free (or mostly free) post high school education. Families that may have a difficult time affording college or career training can now get most, if not all, of that cost paid. It is important to note that this scholarship is not only for study at state universities, it can also be used at technical and trade schools. Learn to be a mechanic, nurse, teacher, hair stylist, doctor, fire fighter, etc. without the fear of tuition costs.

To enroll in the College Bound Scholarship Program, families need to meet certain income requirements. Typically, those students who are on free or reduced lunch are eligible for this program, but other income considerations can be considered. If the income requirements are met, then students are asked to pledge that they will graduate high school with a 2.0 GPA, be a good citizen (no felony arrests), apply to college, and apply for financial aid by completing the FAFSA or WASFA in the senior year of high school. Lastly, the only time students can enroll is in their 7th and 8th grade years, so do not delay; there is no way to go back and seek enrollment once the deadline has passed.

Applications will be provided to all students that we know currently qualify for the program. All families need to do is look for the application and help your student complete it. Return the completed application to MWMS and we will mail it for you. Helpful information about our Attendance Policy

Regular attendance is vital to the quality of a child's education. Parents are the key in establishing and maintaining punctual, regular attendance habits. Each school has specific attendance policies listed in student handbooks; parents are encouraged to review these policies with their students.

Early Dismissal Best practice is to send your student with a note the morning of the day you need to pick your student up. Please designate the time of pick up and if someone else will be picking them up other than yourself. Your student will be issued an Early Dismissal Pass and be released at the documented time. During school hours (not immediately before or after school) you may enter the staff parking lot and meet your student in the Main Office where you will check your student out. If a note has not been sent with your student in the morning you will need to come to the Main Office and request your student's release. **We do not accept phone calls for early release.**

Late Arrivals Students arriving after school starts are considered tardy. Tardies can be excused by a phone call, note or email to the attendance office and need to be done within <u>24 hours</u>. Tardies accrue, at the fifth <u>unexcused</u> tardy, students receive a consequence and for every unexcused tardy following the fifth tardy will continue to result in a consequence. Students arriving more than 15 minutes late are considered truant, this late arrival, if not excused within 24 hours will receive a consequence.

Absences If a child is kept home due to illness, appointment, or any other reason, the attendance office should be notified as soon as possible. You may contact our attendance office directly by calling **(360) 874-6170**, e-mailing <u>med-</u> <u>dles@skschools.org</u> or use the Attendance Application on your Skyward account to report your student's absence. School personnel will try to contact parents if this has not been done. If you have not notified the school to excuse your student's absence, please send them with a note when they return to school.

Physicians advise that a child be fever-free 24 hours before resuming normal activity.

Homework Requests Parents may request, after the 2nd consecutive full day of absence, that their child's assignments be gathered. To make a homework request, please contact the Main Office at **(360) 874-6172**. Requests made before 9:00 a.m. will be available for pick-up in the Main Office at 2:45 on the following business day.
